Human-Predator Conflict, Mamili National Park, Namibia

Project - In Mamili National Park, in the Caprivi Delta of Namibia and the surrounding community areas, conflict between lions, leopards, cheetahs, spotted hyenas, wild dogs and people not only endangers the survival of the animals whose numbers have declined significantly in recent years, but also threatens the lives and livelihoods of some of the most marginalised people in the developing world. There is urgent need to find strategies to show humans and wildlife can exist together and in close proximity. This project involves:

- Purchasing and fitting GPS collars to problem animals to enable tracking, alerting and relocation of the animal if necessary
- Workshops on animal husbandry and kraal construction (predator-proof cattle holding areas)
- Purchase of solar garden lamps for use round kraals at night

Organisation - Biosphere Expeditions promotes sustainable conservation and preservation of the planet's wildlife by forging alliances between scientists and the public. Working closely with local people and scientists, expeditions aim to benefit the local community, their society and their environment, particularly to make a difference to the survival of a particular species or habitat under threat.
